## Dr Clifford Craig Inducted into the Hall of Fame

Dr Clifford Craig's impressive contribution to Launceston's medical community has been recognised at this year's Australia Day awards, which saw his induction into the Launceston City Council's Hall of Fame. Mayor Albert van Zetten said "Dr Craig, who died in 1986, had been instrumental in ensuring the success of the Launceston General Hospital as a regional medical and teaching centre".

It was obviously a proud achievement for the family, Dr Clifford Craig's daughter Jane was in attendance as the Hall of Fame presentation was accepted by his son, Warren Craig who came from Victoria to accept the award on behalf of his family.

Previous recipients include the first Editor of the Examiner, John West; Dame Marjorie Parker; Samuel Sutton and Alexander Lithgow.

The Clifford Craig Medical Research Trust was strongly represented at the various Australia Day Awards. Trust Director, Mr Ken Bassett, received a Citizen Award for his outstanding service for more than 25 years to numerous community groups in a voluntary capacity. Alec Purves, Chairman of Clifford Craig Medical Research Trust Dorset Branch, was recognised with an OAM for his contribution to the Australian aquaculture industry as the founder of Tasmania's first commercial aquaculture venture, Sevrup Industries. Sandra French, volunteer on our North West Committee, received an Order of Australia Member for her service to local government.

1919 – 1924	Studied Medicine at the University of Melbourne
1926	Appointed Surgeon-Superintendent Launceston General Hospital
1932 – 1941	Honorary Surgeon Launceston General Hospital
1951	Resigned as Director of Surgery, giving up surgical practice due to a soap allergy affecting his hands
1953 – 1966	President Medical Council of Tasmania
1956	Appointed to Board of Management Launceston General Hospital
1961	Honorary Consultant Radiologist Launceston General Hospital
1963	President National Trust of Australia (Tasmania)
1971 – 1973	President Australian Cancer Society
1977	Retired from medical practice
1986	Dr Clifford Craig died 5 September

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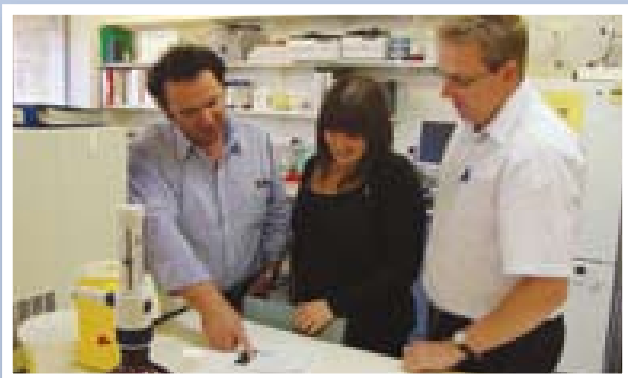
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## Research Update: Immune Cells in a Sick Environment

Chronic Kidney Disease (CKD) is a debilitating and eventually fatal disorder unless a successful transplant can be performed. In addition to problems with blood pressure control, the immune system, which fights infection, is severely impaired in CKD patients.

A project funded by the Clifford Craig Medical Research Trust is investigating a hypothesis, which if proved correct, could improve the immune function of people with CKD. The study is being undertaken by Assoc Prof Dominic Geraghty, Dr Murray Adams, Prof Rob Fassett, Assoc Prof Jeff Coombes and Bachelor of Biomedical Science Honours Candidate, Yvette Shegog.

The aim of the proposed study is to investigate whether a novel protein (TRPV1), that causes cells to die, may be responsible for impaired immune cell function and reduced immune cell numbers in CKD. To do this, 120 participants will be involved in the study whereby immune cells will be obtained from three groups: - (a) volunteers without CKD, (b) CKD patients not yet requiring dialysis and (c) CKD patients on dialysis.

If altered TRPV1 levels are found to contribute to impaired immune function in CKD patients, it may be possible to use medicines to block the action of TRPV1 and improve the quality of life of these chronically ill people.

An additional benefit from the study is that it further strengthens the ongoing research collaboration between the Clifford Craig Medical Research Trust, the University of Tasmania and the Launceston General Hospital through the Renal Unit and the Pathology Department.

## Meet the Dorset Friends

## Medical Students Given the Opportunity to Undertake Research

Evolving and growing as a research trust, whilst maintaining the vision and ethos of our Founding Members is an integral key to the success of the Clifford Craig Medical Research Trust. Attracting specialist clinicians and supporting the Launceston General Hospital as a teaching hospital, whilst providing the opportunity for effective medical research in Northern Tasmania, were the main ingredients that led to the establishment of this organisation in 1992.

We are proud to announce an initiative which is both a step forward and a reinforcement of our foundation. Our provision of a \$5,000 grant to the Launceston Clinical School has enabled two promising young medical students to undertake an Honours Program within the Launceston General Hospital. The Honours Program, which is taken between the medical student's 3rd and 4th year, enables students to graduate with a research qualification (Bachelor of Medical Science) in addition to the basic medical degree, whilst instilling and nurturing a desire for research.

Carli Armstrong and Jessica Kawa are the successful recipients of our \$5000 grant and are currently taking one year from their medical studies at the University of Tasmania in Hobart to join us in our research centre. Carli and Jessica are assisting in establishing a Tasmanian Branch of the National Genetic Heart Registry. Our Chairman, Professor Don McTaggart, Cardiologist, is overseeing the project and Dr Kath Ogden, from the Launceston Clinical School and General Practitioner, is supervising on a day to day basis. A requirement of the Honours Program is that students identify a clinical question that needs answering so Carli and Jessica have each designed a cardiology

research proposal, based around and complimenting their collecting of data for the National Genetic Heart Registry.

The Clifford Craig Medical Research Trust, the Launceston Clinical School and the University of Tasmania

School of Medicine are encouraging research among medical students studying in Launceston through this initiative. Jessica and Carli will have the opportunity to complete their final two years at the Launceston Clinical School where they will have access to further research opportunities.

Dr Kath Ogden notes *The Launceston Clinical School has a strong philosophy of promoting research activity amongst its students and the honours program is one way that we are able to do this. In addition we have students who are willing to be involved in research to a lesser extent while continuing their medical studies. We already have a number of students working with Clifford Craig Medical Research Trust funded researchers and hope to continue to expand these opportunities in the future. Collaboration between CCMRT, LGH and the University of Tasmania can only serve to increase research capacity in Northern Tasmania by integrating research, clinical and educational capability.*

## Tasmanian Researchers on the World Stage

**Two of our leading Northern Tasmanian researchers have been invited to present their work at major international conferences.**

Associate Professors George Razay and Shan Rajendra are both undertaking potentially ground-breaking research projects which are being funded by the Clifford Craig Medical Research Trust. Well recognised for his research into treatable dementia, Associate Professor George Razay will be presenting his work at the 2010 World Congress of Internal Medicine in Melbourne.

Associate Professor Shan Rajendra, who is undertaking research into oesophageal cancer, has been asked to speak at the 2010 Asia Pacific Digestive Week in Kuala Lumpur where he will also share a session with Professor Prateek Sharma, from the United States, who is recognised internationally for his research interests in upper gastrointestinal diseases.

This year marks the 18th year since the Clifford Craig Medical Research Trust was founded in 1992. Since commencing as CEO in November last year I have taken the opportunity to research the history of the Trust and I simply marvel at the visionaries who established this wonderful organisation.

The original objectives for the Trust were to (a) raise funds for medical research into Northern Tasmanian health issues, (b) support our local hospital as a major teaching hospital, (c) forge strong bonds between the hospital, the community, and the northern campus of the University of Tasmania, and (d) provide funds to improve and develop the skills of our hospital staff.
